The Senior School focus on preparing students for life after school; our aim is to broaden students' post-school options. As part of a community engagement program students participate in a range of activities in the local community that promote student engagement with school and build positive relations with local organisations. Students are offered excursions throughout the year that occur in the wider community (outside of Ballarat, for example, Melbourne, Geelong).

Camps are organised and facilitated in order to ensure all students are able to participate in the experience with their peers in a way that caters for their needs. Whilst camps have an overnight aspect, there is always the opportunity for students to participate for the day only (this usually aligns with usual school hours). During these activities students are provided with opportunities to practise life skills in a supportive environment, including but not limited to maintaining personal hygiene, budgeting and traveling safely. Students will develop their interpersonal skills through associating and spending time with their peers.

As a mini-school, students participate in an end of year lunch together. This 'Christmas Lunch' occurs during the final week of November where the students enjoy a hot lunch and celebrate the learning that has taken place throughout the year. Students also have an end of term lunch, which incorporates an assembly in the form of a celebration of learning across VPC (Victorian Pathways Certificate) and VET.

FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the requirements of the Curriculum. This includes the Victorian Curriculum F-10, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) including the VCE Vocational Major and the Victorian Pathways Certificate.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

Curriculum Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum.

Other Contributions

Voluntary financial contributions for noncurriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

Extra-Curricular Items and Activities

Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).

FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.
- Schools have a nominated parent payment contact person(s) that parents can have a confidential discussion with regarding financial hardship arrangements.



SCHOOL PROCESSES

• Schools must obtain school council approval for their parent payment arrangements and publish all requests and communications for each year level on their school website for transparency.
